Dear friends in Christ,

On the first Sunday of Lent, a child came and sat with me on the sanctuary steps. She was wearing **red sparkle shoes**, just like Dorothy from the *Wizard of Oz*. Red sparkle shoes always mean "There's no place like home."

Returning to Tabernacle to worship God with you, was like coming home. My foot is still healing, and I am confident that by Springtime, walking will be a joyous experience. Meanwhile, your prayers and kindness have filled me with the Holy Spirit.

Lent begins with a pilgrimage. Jesus walked out into the wilderness. He was healing from the loss of his friend and prophet John the Baptist, and he was preparing for a life that would be centered **ONLY** on God.

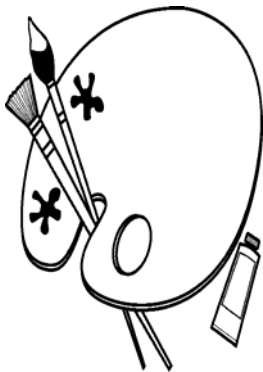
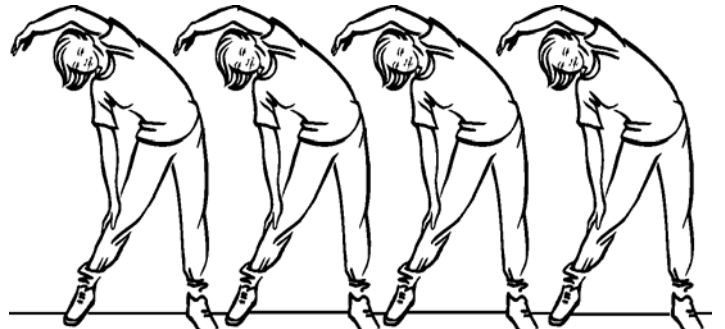

It's going to be another blessedly busy year for deacons!

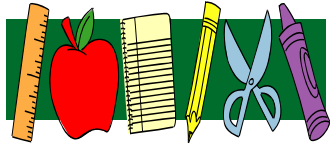

# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

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We are now in the season of Lent. Lent comes from the Latin word meaning springtime or the lengthening of days. It's a period of 40 days, excluding Sundays, prior to Easter. 40 days was chosen by the early church in the fourth century because 40 days is the length of time Moses, Jesus and other Biblical characters went into the wilderness to prepare for various tasks.

Lent is the time for the color purple. It is a time of preparing. Purple is the color of Kings. We are preparing for the coming of a king and his going and his coming again. We are preparing for the Mystery of Easter. It is a serious time. It takes many weeks to get ready to enter the Mystery of Easter.

During this time of preparing, the church offers the Lenten season as a period of time for introspection, self examination and repentance. The church teaches that Lent is an intentional time for prayer, spiritual disciplines, reflection and almsgiving. The church also teaches that our bodies are temples and a gift from God. During Lent we should not separate our physical care from our spiritual care.

To help you in your Lenten spiritual practice, Tabernacle is again offering the mind, body, soul experience of Yoga on Tuesdays.

There are two opportunities to give yoga a try. One is Tuesday evenings, 6:45 – 8:15 PM for \$12.00 or Tuesday mornings, 8:45 – 10:00 AM for \$10.00 each session, starting February 27. Michelle Gallant is a Kripalu Certified Yoga Instructor, and is licensed in therapeutic body work of massage, Reiki, and cranial sacral therapy. Come connect body and soul through the breath and discover the spiritual practice you have been craving.

If you can't join us for Yoga, try one of the Bible Studies offered in the Pastor's study with Rev. Laura on either Monday mornings or Thursday evenings starting March 5. Another opportunity is the Artist in Worship program that will be on going in the balcony during Lent beginning February 25. Try your artistic expression by sketching, sculpting, or painting.

Or you might easily and intentionally add one or all of these into an already busy lifestyle.

After turning off your alarm each morning, open your eyes and before getting out of bed, recite this from the Psalms: "This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it." Live each day from a place of gratitude. Decide that your day will be a day joy filled with God's light and love.

Water is an important symbol of God's abundant and life giving grace. As you soap and rinse in the shower, pray to have washed away all feelings of anger, hostility, bitterness, or guilt. Recall the words of Jesus at the well 'whoever drinks the water I give will never be thirsty again!'

During your daily commute turn your drive time into a time of prayer. After you start your engine, put your hands on the steering wheel. Before pulling out, breathe deeply three times. Ask the God to steer you all day.

If you work in a building with stairs, make them work as part of a spiritual discipline for your body and your soul. Climb each step thoughtfully, breathing slowly. Use the climb to experience a connection with God. Pause on each landing. Focus on the many blessings in your life. Say thank you God and then continue climbing the staircase.

If your building has no stairs, as you enter your place of work, say a silent prayer. Add your smile to the space. As you walk to your office silently ask God to bless each person you see or whose office you pass.

As persons in ministry we are all very busy. We multi-task constantly, writing on our computers while listening for emails to enter from the web, talking on the phone while photocopying etc. Instead of dividing oneself between assorted and varied tasks, do one thing at a time-prayerfully, intentionally offering your work in ministry as a gift to God and to God's people that you serve.

Instead of reviewing a "to do" list, create a "to-be" list. Let words like kind, welcoming, compassionate, generous, peaceful and loving permeate your thinking. Imagine God's love and grace floating inside and with you through the day.

"Native Americans have this proverb: "Never let a day go by without touching the earth with your foot." During the day, take a ten or fifteen minute break to walk outside in a meditative way. Focus on your walking. Observe your breathing. Be reflective. Become aware of the beauty of the earth and its creatures that you see or hear. Listen for sounds of nature. The creation can make us aware of the presence of our Creator.

Chances are you'll no longer be tempted to make those wrong food choices. If you do give in to the temptation, remember, God forgives you.

If you make lunches for your family, children and adults alike, while preparing each person's lunch pray for the person sending the prayer right into their lunch. Visualize them as they open and eat their meal. Send them a warm smile into their bag too. Tuck in a written grace, blessing or love note or write a special message on their napkin.

Cooking can be offer spiritual nourishment as well as provide physical nourishment. While making dinner or some other meal, reflect on other times that you made the dishes you are getting ready. Pay attention to the memories that are kindled. Bless all those who are in your recollections, thanking God for the spiritual nourishment these people have given you. As you serve the meal, thank God for each person present.

## Recap of Learning and Serving Mission Trip

On February 16 and 17 eight Tabernacle middle school youth attended a Learning and Serving Mission Trip to Charlestown. After spending Friday night at First Church in Charlestown, our group combined with West Parish from Andover on Saturday morning. We traveled by car to Chelsea to help move boxes from Chelsea to Malden for the **Ministries of Aides International, Inc.**, a children's support organization in Haiti. We also helped build office dividers in their newer bigger brighter space in Malden. Pictures from our trip are in the Bigelow Room. The following article is written by Ian MacLean who attended this trip.

“For the youth group mission trip we went to a church in Charlestown. Other churches were coming as we arrived. When we first got there it was a little awkward but then everyone got there and settled down. Then we played some cards which was the ice breaker it got everyone communicating and making friends. The game we played was spoons a really fun game but a lot of people stopped and then there was just a small group of us really talking and having a blast. The next morning when we all woke up we had breakfast it was a buffet line and we sat down once again starting to talk with other kids from other churches. Then our church and one from Andover went to help a small church that sends supplies to orphans in Haiti. They support three thousand children without parents. So what we did was move boxes of supplies from their small office to a bigger office so from their they will be shipped to the orphanage. Also we help paint the office and put up cubicles. It was fun but still it was really hard. The Lutheran's pace of working was a lot slower than we were used to. It was very rewarding though I had a lot of fun and learned a lot about how life isn't as good for some as it is for others.”

With all the publicity about the First Church silver it reminded me of an article that Alice Woodbury wrote many years ago about Tabernacle silver. It has been run before in this column but with many new people it seems appropriate to run it again.

Also, Nancy Lutts has framed several pictures of some of our interesting pieces and they are hanging in the Bigelow Room so you can see what they actually look like. The silver was given to the church over many years by thoughtful parishioners. Kay Piemonte

### CHURCH SILVER

The term "church silver" used in this article always refers to the silver used at the two sacraments celebrated in Protestant churches, the sacrament of baptism and the sacrament of communion.

Whenever we speak of church silver we must remember that dates engraved thereon are often misleading, also that some pieces were first used in private homes before being given for the church's use.

Two examples of this are our two baptismal basins and two mugs marked IB and IT.

On November 8, 1708, Benjamin Browne, a merchant of Salem, made a will in which he bequeathed "unto ye church of Salem, fifty pounds money, about ye one halfe towards ye furnishing of ye Lord's Table and ye other halfe for purchasing a decent Bason for Baptism."

Benjamin Browne died a month later, December 7, 1708.

The silver basin was made and used at the First Church.

Evidently when the division came in the "First Church" in 1735, and the "Third Church" was formed, this baptismal basin was given to the "Third Church", as a part of the share of the church silver.

Then later, when the "Third Church" was divided into the Tabernacle and South Churches, these two churches decided that "The Christening Bason being so large, the Committee agreed that it should be melted up and that two Basons be made of the same to accommodate both churches."

This evidently was done.

One basin was engraved "The Gift of Benjamin Browne, Esqr. To the now Tabernacle Church of Christ in Salem, 1708."

The other "The gift of Benjamin Browne, Esqr. To the now Third Church of Christ in Salem, 1708."

(At this time South church was called "Third Church", while at other times Tabernacle was so-called.)

The original date, 1708, the date the money was bequeathed to First Church for a baptismal basin, was engraved on the now two basins, although there was no "Third Church" until 1735, and no Tabernacle and South Churches until 1774, also the division of silver from the Third Church between Tabernacle and South was not made until 1785.

The three most valuable pieces of church silver, which Tabernacle Church owns, are the two baptismal basins and the beaker-shaped cup with the maker's mark of Jeremiah Dummer (1645-1718) of Newbury, Massachusetts.

These without question (i.e. the original large baptismal basin) were used by the First Protestant Church organized in America, at Salem, 1629.

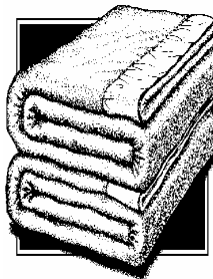
