## An Invitation to Write

I'd like to tell you a story about how I spent St. Patrick's Day weekend. No, it has nothing to do with pub crawls or green beer...although I have a tale or two like that from St. Patty's Days past but a story of a spiritual nature and God's unusual sense of humor.

Months ago I booked a getaway to Kripalu, a yoga retreat center in the Berkshire Mountains, to attend a weekend workshop with my creativity guru Julia Cameron. For those of you who don't know, Julia Cameron is the author of *The Artist's Way*. Basically a 12-step program for recovering creative types like me. As I counted down the final days to my trip, I was giddy with excitement yet equally panicky about the impending Nor'easter hitting Massachusetts the day I was scheduled to drive out there. I began to hesitate about going and wondered if Julia Cameron might not fly up from New York City because of the storm.

So the night before my trip, I call to check on any possible cancellations. The lovely lady on the other end of the line assures me there are none. That does it. If Julia Cameron can brave the weather so can I. I decide to get a head start on my journey and leave early. The ride out wasn't too bad though and I made it to Kripalu snow-covered but safe and sound. As I head into the reception area, I am greeted by the scent of sage and the mellow sounds of new age music. Ahhhh...I have arrived.

At the reception counter, I am welcomed by another lovely lady. She begins check-in by taking my name and handing me my itinerary. Suddenly time stops in the milliseconds it takes me to read the name of my workshop leader. The name staring up at me in big bold letters is not Julia Cameron but Natalie Goldberg. I am a bit shocked but I pull myself together and politely inform the smiling receptionist that I am not here for the Natalie Goldberg workshop but the Julia Cameron one. Now, she looks shocked and replies: "Weren't you told? Julia Cameron cancelled a week ago. She's *VERY* sick." Obviously, I have not heard. I try my best to appear calm but on the inside I'm losing it. She apologizes profusely and assures me that Natalie Goldberg is *AMAZING*. "Here, read the *NEW* workshop description I'm *SURE* you'll *LOVE* it," she swears like a used car salesman. I scan the description and words immediately pop out at me is 'become' 'a' 'writer.' Next thing I know the yelling of my inner most yet so familiar critic vibrates through my head, "YOU ARE NOT A WRITER!"

The kicker to all this is: I write every single day. I *faithfully* keep a journal. My writings range from mindless drivel to my deepest secrets; from everyday to-do lists to conversations with God. I may not have published anything (yet) but I am most certainly a writer. Before this workshop, I would not have called myself a writer but there was someone who knew me by that name – God. Now the reason I say God has an unusual sense of humor is because God knew that Julia Cameron cancelled. God also knew that I shouldn't know. For whatever reason, I did not receive the cancellation e-mail. I was meant to be at that workshop. And if I had known a writer's workshop would replace Julia Cameron's creativity workshop, I would have without doubt cancelled. I was meant to attend Natalie Goldberg's workshop and God connivingly plotted to get me there.

Being at at Kripalu and especially at Natalie Goldberg's workshop was the most profound experience of my life. I am grateful to God for not letting me miss it and I would like to share my experience with others at Tabernacle Church. If you are a writer openly, proudly, secretly or hesitantly, I am planning to start a weekly writer's group based on the principles of Natalie Goldberg's workshop. She is the author of many books most notably *Writing Down the Bones*. Basically a book for struggling writers. The Sunrise service will be held at Salem Willows. Sunrise is at 6:15am plan to park and arrive by 6:10am! Salem Willows offers ample parking.

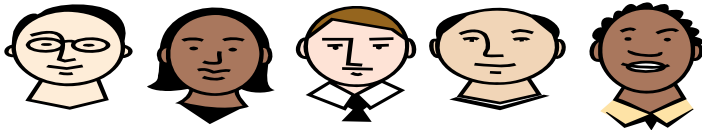

### From The Deacons

The deacons led two worship services during the last week of Rev. Laura's recuperation, February 18 and Ash Wednesday. We were fortunate to have Ed Curtin give the sermon on the 18th and one of our new deacons, Denise Turner, led the Prayers of the People and offertory prayers and blessings and scripture reading was by Jim Dillon. It was obvious to all that this was not Denise's first time leading worship service, she comes with that experience and it showed. To Ed, Denise and Jim, we are grateful for their participation.

Ash Wednesday saw a smaller turnout than we've seen in the past, only 18 people including deacons, but it was a more intimate setting. A light supper was served consisting of soup, chowder, bread, cheese and crackers.

Leading the service was Rob Maier, Jim Dillon and me. The service was one of prayer, silent meditation, two short readings from well-known Christian writers on the topic of Ash Wednesday, and a short conversation followed by the anointing with ashes.

I can't begin to express the feeling that comes from anointing the faithful with ashes, it is both humbling and joyful. Ash Wednesday is an ancient ritual that is more of a Catholic rite than UCC. However, there are many former Catholics in the congregation (myself included) and we tend to hold on to some of those rituals and beliefs that have been ingrained in our psyches since childhood. There is still something reassuring and comforting about observing Ash Wednesday. As with any service, being in worship with the congregation, however small, is a privilege and an honor that fills me with the power of the Holy Spirit.

Coming up will be the Maundy Thursday service which is a dramatic retelling of the Easter story, or the Passion, by the deacons and Rev. Laura on April 5, at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. Also ahead for the deacons is the New Member Luncheon on Sunday, March 25 following worship service and a New Member breakfast/fellowship meeting on Saturday, April 14 from 10a.m. until noon. New members will join Tabernacle on Sunday, April 15.

### Religious Education

April and Spring Time! The redwing blackbirds are singing in the meadows, the mud is beginning to dry and we are enjoying the lengthening of each day. Our April calendar

is busy beginning with day 1!

**April 1 is Palm Sunday.** The children will lead us into Jerusalem with a palm and robe procession, costumes, and Jesus riding a donkey. Throughout the week there are opportunities to come close to God and experience the last week of Jesus human life. Check the church calendar here or in the weekly bulletin.

If you are unable to attend the events, we suggest you take an opportunity to study and reflect upon the story that makes us Christian. The Daily Lectionary suggests the following readings from John as a way to read the story of the week.

**Monday read John 12: 1- 11, Tuesday read John 12: 20 – 36, Wednesday read John 13:21-32, Thursday read John 13:1-17, 31 b-35, Friday read John 18: 1-19, and Saturday read John 19:38-42.** Then join us for the Easter Sunrise service to rejoice with each other over the empty tomb and the new covenant with Jesus as he lives within us. The Easter service at 10 AM will present an opportunity to create a living flower cross from a barren one. Come transform your own barren muddied Lenten life into a living growing Easter life full of hope and grace.

The children will be finishing up their Lenten fund raiser for Heifer with a visit to the Heifer Farm, Overlook Farm in Rutland MA, on Wednesday, April 18, during the April school vacation.

This is especially appropriate for the younger grades. It is an all day trip, 9 - 2. A sign up sheet is located on a clip board in the Bigelow Room/fellowship room. Permission slips are available there as well. We visited a couple of years ago and had a great time.

Also during the April school vacation the JYF and PF will organize a yard clean up day to celebrate Earth Day. Every age is encouraged to come. Plan to come to the church Friday, April 20<sup>th</sup> by 9:30 with gloves, brooms, rakes and a bag lunch, drinks will be provided. It's great to have children volunteer and it's a great experience for them, but we will be sure to have adequate adult supervision. Each adult will be assigned 3 children to watch. #### **Missions Sunday, April 29<sup>th</sup>:**

On Sunday, April 29<sup>th</sup> the guest preacher will be the Rev. Christine Elliott, pastor of the United Methodist Church, working on Heifer International's volunteer staff in eastern Massachusetts. The mission of Heifer is to work with communities to end hunger and poverty and to care for the earth. Heifer has been at work for over 60 years in 128 countries and 38 states (U.S.) providing families with livestock to improve their nutrition and to provide a sustainable source of income to bring them out of poverty.

The core principle of Heifer's work is "passing on the gift", which means that each partner commits to giving the first offspring animal to the next person or family on the community's list of recipients. Many partners give more than the single animal required! Rev. Elliott's sermon will focus on gender equity. It's always a surprise to people that so many of the world's poor are women. After the service there will be a table in the Bigelow room with information explaining the mission of Heifer.

## Did You Know?

We continue with the article regarding the church silver.....

Now about the mugs.

Many pieces of silver used in the early churches were

originally made for use in the home and were either presented or bequeathed to the churches by their owners. That is one reason why some colonial silver owned by churches today is often in household form.

Banks were unknown in those days, so prosperous colonists often had their surplus coin melted down and made into handsome household objects, which could be easily identified, in case of theft, by the engraving and the makers' marks

The two silver mugs, marked IB and IT, owned by Tabernacle Church, are an example of this. (I think)

The inscription is more ornamental than that on most communion silver, having the initials inscribed in oval panels, which are suspended from a bowknot.

The only solution to this ornamental design, which seems reasonable to me is, that IB, whoever he was, had had some of his coin melted down into these mugs for use in his home.

Later, when perhaps he wanted to reward a friend, John Treadwell, for a kindness rendered, he had the mugs inscribed with the ornate inscription and gave them, to IT (John Treadwell) who later presented them to Tabernacle Church.

Another question which I would like solved, is, what became of the five mugs given to Tabernacle Church in December, 1785, when there was an equal division of "plate" between the so-called Third Church (South) and Tabernacle Church, plate that had evidently belonged to the original Third Church, organized in 1735. The five mugs that went to south Church have been identified but no further reference to those left to Tabernacle Church has ever been found.

## Did You Know about these Mission Trips Offered?

### Did you know that the MACUCC is Offering Light and Life in New Orleans?

The Massachusetts Conference Partnership with Good Shepherd UCC in Metairie, Louisiana offers the following Mission trips to New Orleans. In cooperation with the Worcester Area Mission Society, UCC, there are three kinds of trips being offered.

#### **Work Trips are scheduled for: May 26 – June 2, 2007 and November 10 -17, 2007.**

These trips to date have been gutting out homes that were badly flooded and beginning to work on the reconstruction of homes. Matching skilled professionals with amateur carpenters and folks of little or no carpentry skill level is part of these trips.

#### **Teacher-to Teacher pilot program trip is scheduled for April 14 – 21, 2007.**

This trip is looking for teachers, teacher's aids, and school librarians, who have introduced creative or interesting curriculum, programs or ideas into their classrooms. These educators will go in pairs to a Gulf Coast school for the week, living in the community, sharing their skills and being present to the staff and children. If you are an educator, dramatist, musician or screen actor come down and present a historical drama or classroom experience "roadshow".

#### **Special Youth Work Trip is scheduled for June 23 - 30, 2007.**

**All participants must be 16 years of age or older.** Folks from ages 16 -76 have been meaningfully included in previous trips!

**Cost is \$900.00** and includes airfare, room, board, vehicle rentals and fuel, missionary accident insurance, leadership, \$200 donation for materials.

**Housing is dormitories** set up at the Good Shepherd UCC in the New Orleans area.
